

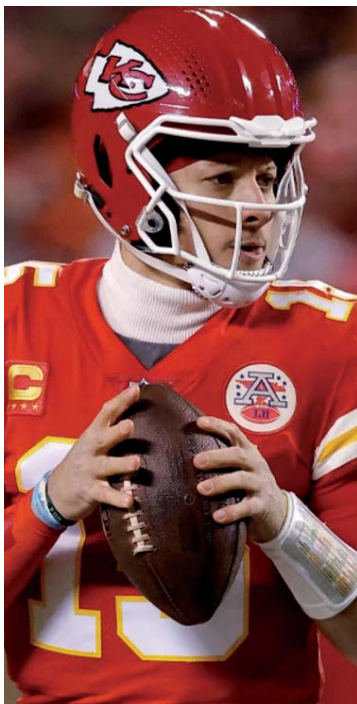

It feels like we penned these words not long ago, and indeed we did. It's only been two years since the Chiefs defeated the Eagles 38-35 in Super Bowl LVII at Glendale. Two years later, we are back on football's biggest stage for another thrilling rematch in Super Bowl LIX. Let's quickly review how they got here...

Kansas City's fortunes took a significant turn when they hired Andy Reid as their head coach 12 years ago and capped that in 2017 when they drafted Patrick Mahomes as their quarterback. The pivotal moment occurred when Chiefs' scout Brett Veach spotted something unexpected while watching a video of a Texas Tech offensive lineman. When Reid inquired about what Veach was watching, he confidently responded, "The future quarterback of the Chiefs."

After convincing Reid and making some strategic draft moves, Mahomes became integral to the Chiefs. Unsurprisingly, two years later, Veach was promoted to General Manager. With it, the Chiefs join the Patriots as the only teams to ever reach five Super Bowls within six years (the Pats have done it twice).

On the other hand, the Eagles enter the Super Bowl on a five-game exact win skein. That's good news for Eagles fans as, since 1981, only six different teams have done the same, and they went 5-1 SUATS in their Super Bowl game—Kansas City last season—including 3-0 SUATS as a dog.

It all sets the table for a must-see SB LIX. Meanwhile, we put the Well-Oiled Machine to the task in this matchup, and here are a few of the many nuggets that spewed out...

PLAY IT AGAIN SAM

Kansas City became the NFL's first consecutive Super Bowl champions since the New England Patriots last pulled off the feat 21 years ago.

Only eight such teams in league history have completed the task. Take a look...

- 1966-67 Green Bay Packers
- 1972-73 Miami Dolphins
- 1974-75 Pittsburgh Steelers
- 1978-79 Pittsburgh Steelers
- 1988-89 San Francisco 49ers
- 1992-93 Dallas Cowboys

Elite quarterback play is one of the most significant similarities between back-to-back champs. Every back-to-back champion featured a Hall of Fame quarterback, from Bart Starr to Joe Montana to Tom Brady.

However, before you automatically take the plunge with sure-fire first-ballot Hall of Famer Patrick Mahomes this Super Bowl, you need to know that until this season none of the eight previous double-repeat champions had sniffed the Super Bowl the following season, two of them failing to make the postseason, with the other six falling short of the Big Game, meeting their Waterloo in eventual season-ending playoff losses, going 0-6 SUATS in their quest.

Meanwhile, Kansas City returns looking to become the only NFL team to three-peat in the Super Bowl.

COACHES AND QUARTERBACKS

Last year's Super Bowl coach and quarterback edge clearly favored the Chiefs' head coach, Andy Reid, and quarterback Patrick Mahomes over the 49ers' head coach, Kyle Shanahan, and QB Brock Purdy.

It's a bit of déjà vu – part two this year, with the Chiefs' dynamic duo holding an edge against head Eagle Nick Sirianni and QB Jalen Hurts – although the Philly tandem does not take much of a back seat.

For openers, Sirianni has won more games in his first four seasons (53) than any coach in NFL history... and he's not done yet.

Reid is the winningest coach in Kansas City and Philadelphia's franchise histories. He's a raucous 34-7 SU and 26-15 ATS in games

where his team has an extra week of rest... and also 4-1 SUATS with the Chiefs against the Eagles.

In addition, the Mustache has been just fantastic as either an underdog or a slight favorite of two or fewer points in games in which his team is coming off consecutive SUATS wins at 27-5-1 ATS, including 22-2 ATS in games against foes with a win percentage of greater than .600.

Reid's Chiefs have won a remarkable 12 one-score games this season and, dating back to last season, 17 in a row.

Kansas City is 23-2 SU in the last 25 overall games, with one of the two losses at Denver in the season's final game when the starters were glued to the bench.

Here is the lifetime record of both QBs during the NFL postseason:

Mahomes has won nine straight playoff games, going 8-1 ATS in those same contests.

And then there is Hurts, who brings a lofty 10-3 SU and 11-2 ATS career mark into this contest against .769 or greater foes – with one of the losses coming against the Chiefs in SB LVII. For what it's worth, Hurts has not tossed a pick in seven of his eight career postseason games.

DEFENSE OUTPLAYS OFFENSE

So, which team owns the better defense? Is it a Kansas City Chiefs' crew that ranks No. 2 in overall defense and No. 2 in scoring defense? Or is it a Philadelphia squad that ranks No. 1 in overall defense and No. 1 in overall scoring defense? Question answered.

Considering that teams with the better overall defense have won 47 of the previous 58 Super Bowls, it's unsurprising to learn that the nine previous teams owning the better scoring defense (read: Eagles) are 7-2 SU and 6-3 ATS in head-to-head games. Read into that what you may.

Edge: Eagles

STATISTICALLY SPEAKING

As we alluded to earlier, we're fully aware that "defense wins championships." While that statement may be true, it will be up to Philadelphia's defense to disrupt Kansas City's highly potent attack. That's because the team with the most total yards in a Super Bowl game is 43-15 SU. The team with the most rushing yards is 43-14 SU (the Patriots and the Falcons each rushed for 104 yards in Super Bowl XLI).

The Eagles were 12-6 SU and 9-8-1 ATS this season in games where they rushed for 100 or more yards and 11-1 SU and 8-3-1 ATS in contests in which they outrushed an opponent.

Meanwhile, Philly hit the century mark in 19 of their 20 games on the ground and is 10-2 SU and 9-3 ATS in games when it has the rushing advantage. Conversely, KC was outrushed in 10 games this season.

In addition, the Eagles are 22-1 in their last 23 games when they've won the turnover battle, with the 36-33 loss to Washington in Week 16 being the lone exception. They won the turnover battle, 0-15 (for and against) in their last five games, which matches their current win streak.

Edge: Eagles

COMMON DENOMINATORS

This season, the Chiefs and Eagles faced seven common opponents: the Atlanta Falcons, Baltimore Ravens, Cincinnati Bengals, Cleveland Browns, New Orleans Saints, Pittsburgh Steelers, and Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Kansas City was 7-0 SU, 5-2 ATS, and 5-2 ITS (In The Stats) for a net

average of +44 YPG in the stats. Philadelphia went 5-2 SU, 5-2 ATS, and 4-3 ITS, outgaining its foes by an average of +66 YPG in the stats.

Kansas City took on eleven playoff squads, going 9-2 SU and 5-5-1 ATS while losing the net stats by -108 net YPG. Philly was 8-2 SU and 8-2 ATS, losing the stats by a scant -04 net YPG.

Hence, each team had their way, straight up or against the spread, with ordinary folk.

In addition, the Eagles were +21 in overall net TDs this season. The Chiefs were +05 in overall net TDs

SUPER BOWL HISTORY

- The Chiefs are the fourth team to reach three straight Super Bowls and the first to make the game after winning back-to-back Super Bowls. As hard as it is to win two titles in a row, a three-peat is a rarity among all major sports. Across the NBA, MLB, the NHL, and the WNBA, there have been 14 instances when a team has won three straight titles. The Los Angeles Lakers, from 2000 to 2002, are the last team to complete a three-peat.

- Super Bowl favorites of 5 or fewer points (Kansas City) in 'double rest' affairs – a week of rest before their first playoff game and a week of rest before the big game – are 5-13 SU and 4-15 ATS.

- No. 1 seeds in the Super Bowl (Kansas City) are 15-20 SU and 12-21-2 ATS since 1990, including 7-21 SU and 4-13-2 ATS versus non-No.1 seeds.

- The teams that have failed to score 20 points in the Super Bowl have been 2-25 SU and 4-22-1 ATS since 1980. Teams that score 27 or more points in the Super Bowl are 31-5 SU and 28-7-1 ATS since 1980.

- The SU winner of the Super Bowl game is 49-7-2 ATS. Pick the winner of the game, and you'll likely have a winning ticket.

THEY SAY I'M BETTER THAN YOU

This nugget, per Andy Iskoe of The Logical Approach: Since 1990, the Super Bowl team with the better regular season record is 11-14 SU, with 8 of the 32 Super Bowls since 1990 matching teams with identical regular season records.

But the 25 Super Bowl teams with the better overall record are just 5-19-1 ATS (20%), including a jaw-dropping 5-13 SU and 1-17 ATS since 2004. That, in itself, is mighty strong.

Edge: Eagles

UPS AND DOWNS

The oddsmakers continue to do their best job posting Over/Under totals on Super Bowl games. That's confirmed by the fact that there have been 29 'Overs' and 28 'Unders' in the history of the big game – with no total available in the inaugural game.

FYI: Only 18 of the 58 Super Bowls have been decided by one score (8 or fewer points) or less.

Edge: None

PROP IT UP

The mother lode of Super Bowl props will be posted approximately 4-5 days before the big game by Hall of Fame oddsmaker Jay Kornegay at the Westgate Super Book in Las Vegas.

Two words of caution: 1) the betting public bets on the "yes" and "over" occurrences. The sharps shop the value and play the "no" and the "under" props; and 2) beware of the 'get rich quick' props. The lure of overtime and safeties will be out there, but remember, only TWO Super Bowl games have ever gone to overtime (Super Bowl LI and last year's Super Bowl LVIII), and only 6 of the previous 58 Super Bowls have witnessed a safety, with the last coming in 2013.

Courtesy of VSiN.com – these are some props that have yet to cash over the past 23 Super Bowls...

- Each team to have a TD and a FG in each half: 0-23
- A punt return for a touchdown: 0-23
- Any player with 200+ receiving yards: 0-23

On the flip side, the shortest TD Under 3.5 yards is 21-2 YES.

And, our favorite: Teams to score last in the Super Bowl win the game. YES, each of the last 15 games.

Edge: None

THE SWIFT FACTOR

We'd be remiss if we didn't mention the latest social craze regarding the Chiefs. The fact is that Kansas City has a strong record when Taylor Swift attends its games.

According to various sources, the Chiefs have won 17 out of the 20 games Swift has attended since she began dating Travis Kelce in September 2023, giving them a record of 17-3 with her in the stands (or the VIP loge, if you will).

Additionally, in the NFL Playoffs specifically, the Chiefs have a record of 5-0 straight up (SU) and 4-1 against the spread (ATS) when Swift attends.

HALFTIME WONDER

In retrospect, it's a good thing there was no "in-game" wagering in the early 1990s. Especially considering that in 1993, Michael Jackson's halftime performance in the Super Bowl had higher ratings than the game itself.

Kendrick Lamar is this year's halftime act. This year's game is expected to top last year's record-setting average audience of 123.1 million viewers. Kendrick is even money to beat the King of Pop's numbers. Chew on that.

THE BOTTOM LINE

As we alluded to in previous PLAYBOOK Playoff Guides this postseason, when push comes to shove, you have a better chance of safely walking through a minefield when it comes to beating the lethal combination of defense and a solid rushing offense in big games.

Most importantly, don't panic. The Eagles hold the highest points per game in the fourth quarter (9.3) this season and rank 13th in the league with first-quarter points per game (5). A slow start could be in order for the Birds.

In closing, we saved the best for last: The Eagles arrived at SB LIX after five consecutive home games – the first time for any Super Bowl squad. Since 1980: Previous Super Bowl teams coming off four successive home games are 5-0 SUATS – all as a dog!

Remember this when walking up to the window on Super Sunday.

Do the math. We're doing Fly, Eagles Fly!

SUPER BOWL SMART MONEY

Per Legal Sports Report, a powerhouse Super Bowl 59 matchup between the Philadelphia Eagles and the Kansas City Chiefs that will generate more than \$1.5 billion in legal wagers nationwide. Record-setting handle for the game creates nine figures of revenue potential for sports betting operators, though how much customers win or lose hinges on the result.

Almost 225 million Americans across 40 states and territories have access to legal Super Bowl betting in their local market this year.

Although Nevada has taken a tumble down the year-long leaderboard, its role as the nation's Super Bowl betting capital has so far gone unchallenged. Last year's \$186 million was an all-time record for single-game handle in any market, inflated by hosting the game at Allegiant Stadium. There is no place quite like Las Vegas on a Super Bowl Sunday, with seat reservations at some of the most sought-after sports books running into the thousands of dollars.

New York really should overtake Nevada for first place this time around. Applying its growth over the past 12 months to last year's Super Bowl numbers creates around \$192 million in expected handle this year, up 18.3% from \$162 million in 2024. Nevada would have to shake off a small annual decline and top its own record to approach that number.

The LSR model likes New York to finally claim the top spot at \$183 million, with Nevada and New Jersey filling out the podium in that order.

Firms like Crypto.com now offer this peer-to-peer form of sports speculation that purportedly falls under the jurisdiction of financial regulators rather than gaming regulators, making it legal nationwide. This most notably encompasses the two sleeping giants, California and Texas, both of which still have laws in place that prohibit sports betting by definition.
